PACKAGING AND LABELING RULES

PACKAGING AND LABELING:

Marijuana and marijuana products must be packaged in opaque, resealable, child-resistant packaging A retail marijuana store must affix a label to each package of marijuana or marijuana product that includes

- 1. The store's name or distinctive logo and license number
- 2. The estimated amount of THC in the labeled product; and
- 3. Each of the following statements:

"Marijuana has intoxicating effects and may be habit forming and addictive.";

"Marijuana impairs concentration, coordination, and judgment. Do not operate a vehicle or machinery under its influence.";

"There are health risks associated with consumption of marijuana.";

"For use only by adults twenty-one and older. Keep out of the reach of children.";

"Marijuana should not be used by women who are pregnant or breastfeeding."

Packaging may not have any printed images, including cartoon characters, that specifically target persons under 21 years of age.

Packaging may not closely resemble a familiar food or drink item including candy or be packaged to look like candy, or in bright colors or with cartoon characters or other pictures or images that would appeal to children.

Packaging must protect the product from contamination and may not impart any toxic or damaging substance to the marijuana.

Each package must be identified by a tracking label generated for tracking by the marijuana cultivation facility's marijuana inventory tracking system.

RESTRICTIONS ON SALES:

Retail sales of flower are limited to one ounce of usable marijuana per person per day

Retail sales of marijuana products are limited to seven grams of marijuana concentrate for inhalation per person per day.

Total sales of marijuana and/or marijuana products are limited to 5,600 milligrams of THC per person per day.

Any food or drink that contains marijuana added to another ready to eat or drink product, not including raw ingredients, is considered "adulterated" and may not be sold.

LOCAL CONTROL: Alaska law includes procedures whereby local governments may override state cannabis laws.

RETAIL ONSITE CONSUMPTION: Retail marijuana stores may apply for onsite consumption.
